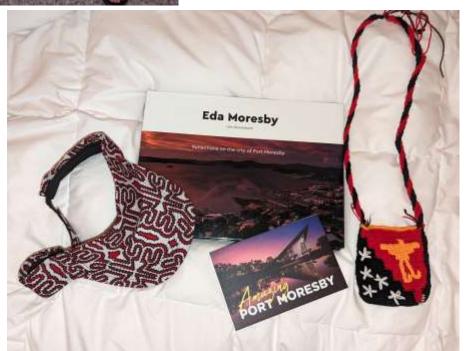

Taupo Marathon Taupo, New Zealand August 5, 2023

Several Marathon Globetrotters continued their Oceania marathon adventure by traveling on to Taupo, New Zealand. Liz and I stopped over in Auckland and went to the Women's World Cup soccer match between USA and Portugal. On the day we arrived in Taupo it was very windy, cloudy and 33 degrees, what we called a "little cold". We had just been in American Samoa, Samoa, Tuvalu, Fiji and Papua New Guinea, where it was a lot warmer. Fortunately on race morning it was 36 degrees (jackets, gloves, stocking hats), but no wind and clear blue skies. A perfect day. We gathered together for a pre-race MG photo with Jay and Jodi Johnson, Karen Michelsen, Tom Craven, Steve Fuller, Liz Gmerek and me. The marathon course (2 out and backs) was along the beachside of Lake Taupo which we could see curved off into the distance almost 6 miles away. And on the far side of the lake were mountains covered in snow. It was Saturday and everyone in Taupo was out with their families enjoying the great weather. At the finish we all sat at a picnic table in the race beer garden (all you can drink) and swapped stories. Steve, Jay and Jodi had more to tell since each of them hit the ground in various ways. Fortunately there were no broken bones or ambulance rides. Steve won the best blood award in



our group. Meanwhile I met up with several New Zealand runners in the beer garden that had more than 100 marathons and a few had more than 300 marathons. I shared with them that there is a worldwide "Mega Marathon" list for greater than 300 and they should be on it. I promised to get their New Zealand 100 club connected with the master list man-

ager. I highly recommend this event, Taupo is worth the trip.

Coastal4Cancer Marathon Grange, Australia (near Adelaide) August 13, 2023

Marathon Globetrotter Ambassador, Jane Struzaker, recommended this event to me. Her running friend, Chris, is the RD. This is a very small low key race with a marathon (12 of us including an Australian Globetrotter named Dave), half and 10 K. I showed up early like always by taxi, because I have no desire to try left-hand driving for the short time in Australia. Roundabouts (traffic circles) are very scary to me. Only 1 person was there, Chris, the RD, setting up the start. I confirmed I was in the right place and let the taxi go. Now I had time to kill so I walked out the 500 foot fishing pier at this location. The race would follow along the seashore for 7 Km out and back, 6 loops. I picked up my packet and the lady asked, "Where are you from?", "Texas, USA", I said. "You came all the way from Texas for this event?" "Well, no, I was also here for marathons in American Samoa, Samoa, Tuvalu, Fiji, Papua New Guinea, and Taupo New Zealand. Immediately she said, "You went to Papua New Guinea?" Apparently not many Australians have or even want to go to Papua New Guinea. It is one of the nearest other nations to Australia. I was the only international runner and that was what they kept calling me. A local runner "High Five" Mike came over and we shared running stories and I again mentioned the "Mega Marathon" list with him. He immediately "Googled" it and found my name (a quick fact check!). Mike said he was at 81 marathons, but was working on 100. And he knew several other Australian runners who had 300 marathons, including Chris, the RD. The race started and if it weren't for the half marathoners I would have been last from the first step. Still I ended up last in the marathon. But I got to run along the beautiful seashore. There was musical entertainment, a few street performers, a couple other piers, many restaurants and coffee shops, beautiful houses with lots of glass windows, and hundreds of people enjoying their Sunday. On one of my loops past the start a couple runners stopped me to talk and one said, "We "Googled" you. You have more than 1000 marathons?". Liz thought that was very funny. Later on I got to talk to Chris and we shared many running stories and I found he has many more events including multi day events and even a 7 Australian states series. But wait, I thought there were 6 Australian states? Plus 2 territories...6, 7 or 8, I don't know! I was confused so decided to save that discussion for another trip. They took great care of me and made me feel welcome. I would not travel around the world for this event, but the people made it fun. And I got a high five twice per lap.

I had asked Brent to write a little bit about his journey to 200 countries but of course, he was too busy celebrating and traveling and running!

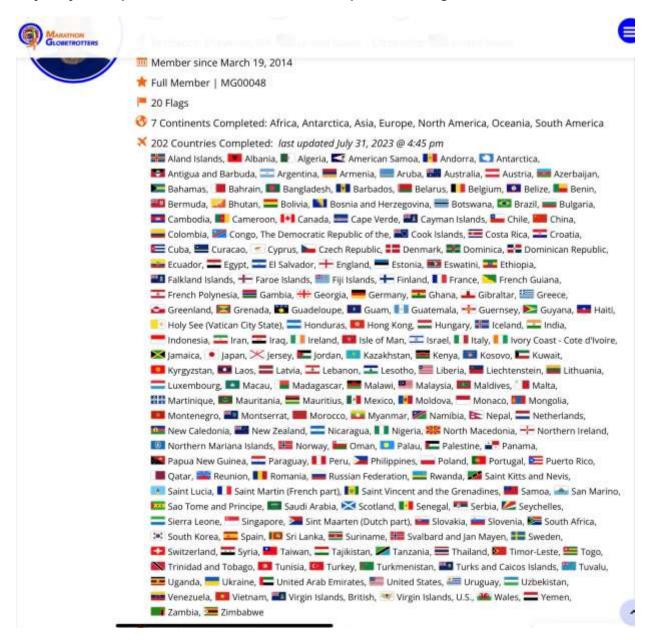

It is never about me, but the fire and the power of the Holy Spirit. I should have died many times over the years from multiple fights with cancer and crazy adventure activities. It would be hard for me to list all of my disabilities; physical, mental, and spiritual. The Almighty has kept me alive to share the free gift of grace and salvation for anybody that opens their heart and soul to accept the message "

The member must comment on this circumstance at time of submission (because it does not satisfy Rule # 10) and may receive a clarifying email from the Membership Director prior to approval. In order to be considered 1 of the 3 or more years must have reached 10 or more finishers. This means that if the event never reaches 10 finishers over the course of its lifetime this rule is not satisfied. In that case an exception may still be submitted. - group mostly agreed.

Six marathons in the South Pacific by Parvaneh Moayedi.

7/12/23, American Samoa, South Pacific Ocean. The journey to run 7 marathon in 7 countries in less than 4 weeks started with a marathon in Pago Pago which is an American territory and military holding for the US on this side of the world. They may not have a military base but it feels like the entire island is a base. There is a McDonald's and the only nice hotel is not so nice. The race organizers were great, the police and locals were very nice. I don't recommend this Island if you are looking for a vacation spot.



South Pacific

watch for crossing

pigs with piglets which can be very dangerous. The organization provided no course support at all. You had to hire a car to follow you for the entire 26 miles so you wouldn't get

7/15/2023, Samoa,

run over by cars or attacked by dogs. You also had to buy your own water for the driver to carry.

7/21/23, Tuvalu, Southern Pacific Ocean. This is a small horse shoe Island with a population of 11,000 people living in complete poverty. I finished the marathon here which was miserably hot. 110 degrees Fahrenheit with 100 percent humidity. It felt like a hot yoga marathon.

We organized the race, well someone else did, and I just had to step in and help.

The majority of people don't have electricity or running water, which means no real bathroom, just outhouses. There is pig farm smell on the entire island, which I assume

people get used to, but I didn't and I felt nauseous during the entire race. I got to meet the Chief of police of the country, the UN ambassador, the director of aviation and the director of sports and education. This was the 1st international marathon run entirely on an international airway, since there are only 3 flights a week, we could use the landing strip to run!

7/25/23, Nadi, Fiji, southern Pacific Ocean. This island is definitely worth visiting with so much to see and do you really only touch the surface. I finished marathon number 4 for this trip and it was very well organized for small event.



7/27/2023, Honiara, Solomon Islands, southern Pacific Ocean. I finished marathon number 5 in less than 2 weeks. This Island's marathon was a last minute race added to my list since it was on the way and a stopover going to Pupa New Guinea.

It is an interesting place with a mixture of 3 major indigenous peoples who live on these remote islands, occupied by, and pulled in different directions by New Zealand, Australia, China and Arab countries, all wanting to take a piece of it.

Most people live in tribes and some in the dark ages. It is one of the few places on earth that cannibalism is still part of life for a few tribes and sacrificing people (children) is practiced when tribes fight and lose a battle. I was told by a local guide /friend I met, not to worry because they don't eat tourists!

7/30/2023, Port Moresby, Papua New Guinea, Southern Pacific Ocean. Marathon number 6 finished in less that 3 weeks in this region of the world. Getting the visa for this country was very hard and a long process so, ended up being a last minute add on for this trip. I only stayed for 2 nights and less than 48 hours.

The marathon was, surprisingly, very well organized and the small group of world marathon chasers got a lot of local news coverage and attention. This country is another of the few places on earth where cannibalism is still part of life in some tribes on remote Islands. Safety is a big concern for tourists. We heard of possible hostage taking as well as getting mugged. It happened to one of the fellow runners from the group who came early and was out on a bird watching trip. He had to cut his trip short before the races started. But of course when traveling the world, specifically to unknown territories anything is to be expected.

Unusual races in interesting places

Footprints from the Past

Sunrise-to-Sunset Marathon (Mongolia)

Hello, fellow Globetrotters! This is an Asian installment on my hope to give you ideas by telling you of unusual races in interesting places I have run. Sunrise-to-Sunset is a good deal harder than any other marathon I've written about, but has an 18 hour time limit (because there is a simultaneous 100K they must wait for anyway). This will be offered most likely be in the first week of August of 2024 – the 2023 version is underway as I write this. But the logistics and planning required are complex enough that starting a year before the race is entirely prudent. (There is even a mandatory kit to carry with a score of required items.)

Why focus on this Mongolian race and not another? First, very few Globetrotters have added Mongolia to their list of accomplishments. Second, the other two Mongolian choices have drawbacks: Ulan Bator is a huge race but I cannot find any time limit information so it may not be feasible; while the Gobi Desert 7-day stage race is harder still than Sunrise-to-Sunset and 5 of the 7 stages are not long enough to count as marathons. Most importantly, of the 825 marathons I have completed, it is this race that vies with the Inca Trail marathon in several categories, including most scenic, most memorable, and greatest bonding of a relatively small group of runners, many of whom have become lifelong friends.

Apart from the race itself, Sunrise-to-Sunset presents three main challenges - it takes more than a week of time to go do it, it is logistically challenging to get to, and it is costly, roughly on the same scale as running an Antarctica marathon. From most locations, commercial air can be used to get to the Mongolian capital of Ulan Bator. (This capital is about 2 ½ hours by jet north of Beijing, and on a latitude similar to Paris.) The organizers then take the runners on a chartered jet several hours further west to the northern fringe of the Gobi desert where ATVs are boarded for the multi-hour ride north to the Lake Khövsgöl National Park, near the border with Russian Siberia. The yurts (Mongolian traditional tents also called gers in Mongolian) along with the foraging yaks become home to the runners (and their families) for almost a week. Usually on the same day of the week as the out-



bound flight, the return fight occurs to get back to Ulan Bator. And that week is not a week of boredom and waiting, as there are kayaks, hiking trails, the second largest (and highest) lake in Mongolia, and a lovely national park to explore in addition to race preparations.

For those who run this, the race is difficult but incredibly memorable. The first 10 km (6 miles) and finishing section are flat and through the forests that line the lake. (The end of this section is in the picture of the 12 km point, showing three MG members, me, my wife, and my daughter.) Then severe uphill begins. The race website description is:

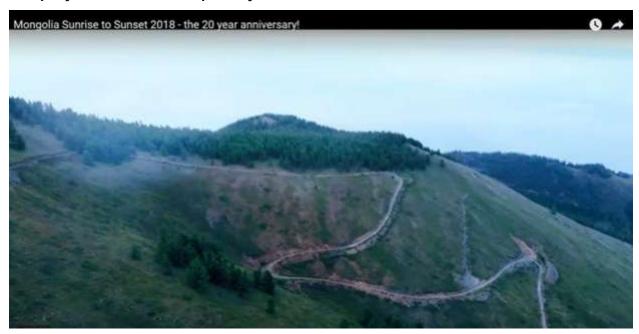


"The event course follows a lakeside single track north of Camp Toilogt through woods and over windblown lowlands for the first 12km (7.5 miles). In the next 5 km, the course departs the lake and heads up over 700 meters (2,400 feet) into the mountains to spectacular views and 2,300 meter (7,550 ft) Chichee Pass. From this first pass, the route heads south along a ridge, descends steeply into a river valley, follows along the river bed through sometimes marshy sections, returns up another river valley, and climbs steeply through a mossy forest to Khirvesteg Pass. From the second pass, runner's descend steeply again to another valley and return to the lakeshore to make their way back to Camp Toilogt and the 42km mark."



But this is an understatement! For example, there are shrines to local family gods along the way, and if a runner fails to circle each shrine three times in a <u>clockwise</u> direction, the locals believe he has brought years of bad luck to the family! In my year, there was an armed Mongol horseman waiting at the shrine (who spoke no English) to ensure every runner did the proper thing to respect the shrine! (The Japanese runner in front of me did not speak English and did not understand the screaming horseman, and took off up the wrong trail up the wrong mountain, so that I had to retrieve him and get him to circle the shrine properly and then proceed up the right mountain!)

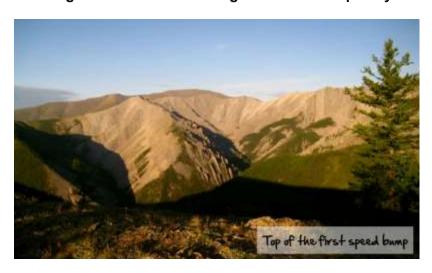
The route has in store a bounty of visual delights and physical challenges – most striking to me was the view from the top of the Siberian mountains to the north, all of barren rock, but with each rock of a different shade of black, gray, or white depending on its composition – strikingly beautiful! This came after an ascent up ankle deep moss beds and along a meter-wide path at the top of a ridge where one dares not look up! And that is followed by a downhill scree slope so steep that every step begins a rockslide and the runner must choose whether to try to run straight down faster than the sliding rocks, or to angle obliquely so that the slides pass by to the side of the runner!



This is a course (like the Inca Trail) that I simply cannot do justice to when describing with simple words, and it also may have surprises from one year to the next. While it is basically two mountain climbs/descents with a valley between the mountains, in my year, the valley was host to a large army of marching ants so thick that the ground was completely cov-

ered and it was necessary to keep up sufficient footspeed that the ants did not climb up the shoes to bite!

Truly, a total adventure and one never to be forgotten!

Multi Marathon Research Study

Leo Lundy didn't have a conclusive update he could share on the study but he said this.

"It's just a little early for any significant update on my work. As you can Imagine universities work at a pace just above evolution. They like to have any results or conclusions of studies published in appropriate journals before general release. That is the stage I am at, getting the results published.

I presented some early results at a sports science conference in Paris last week (European College of Sport Science) and other results are being presented at the IEEE conference in Sydney in a couple of weeks time. Then they get published in the journals and at that time I will be able to fully release them.

The study so far has in excess of 850 engaged from the multi-marathon community from 40 different countries. This is far in excess of expectations and other studies of this kind. The demographics of those engaged in the study are very very similar to those published on the Globetrotter website in terms of gender, and age so the results should be very relevant to the club."

Many Globetrotters donated their running stuff like shoes, shirts and more to the local runners through this meeting.
